# **CHINA SEMINAR HONORS PROF. DANIEL KWOK**

On September 16 the China Seminar began a new season online with a special tribute to Prof. Daniel W.Y. Kwok. Dan established the monthly gatherings of China experts and the community more than 40 years ago.

The largest turnout since China Seminar went to its current virtual format, 164 attendees, was a testament to the high regard in which Dan Kwok and the China Seminar are held by so many in the community. When he was a Professor of History at the University of Hawaii, Dan taught and mentored hundreds of graduate students, many who are now leaders in the community, among them Richard Vuylsteke, president of the East-West Center, who served as program moderator.

Vuylsteke had fond memories of the beginnings of the China Seminar, describing Dan as a person embodying the spirit of Chinese calligraphy, capturing the dynamism of the Yin and Yang. "It (the China Seminar) covers wide ranges of topics on China, somehow integrates them effectively, and bring in a wide-range of people, experts and aficionados, and makes it work," he said.


Since the China Seminar was established in 1977, there have been more than 350 talks with over 250 speakers on a wide range of topics—history, culture, politics, economics, art, theater, music, food, technology, law, medicine, followed by a gourmet lunch at the Maple Garden Restaurant. Since 2009 the China Seminar became a forum of the Friends of the East-West Center.

Former Time Magazine correspondent Richard Hornik reflected on his experience as a speaker. "People who know Dan Kwok want his approval," Hornik said. "Even in my 70s, presenting at the China Seminar is like an oral exam before your favorite professor, the one who both challenged you intellectually but also provided moral support and genuine friendship. "For me, this has meant spending more time than I expected researching topic that I thought I already knew. Each talk to the Seminar has deepened my understanding of China."

Shana Brown, chair of the University of Hawaii's History Department, aptly described Dan as a Confucian gentleman, a Junzi, a man of virtue, humble, generous, sincere, and wise. The pandemic closed the door on meeting at Maple Garden for lunch, and in August 2020 Dan announced that he was stepping down from involvement in the China Seminar. But no one was going to let the program fade into history. It was revived online last December, and while many miss the food and the good conversation among old friends, the tradition of critical thinking and stimulating discussions continues online, opening up the program to a host of attendees and presenters from all over the globe. For the China Seminar old-timers, though, hope remains strong that one day they and the program will return to Maple Garden.

### PANELIST:

### John De Fries President & CEO, Hawai'i Tourism Authority

John De Fries serves as president and CEO of the Hawaii Tourism Authority, the State of Hawaii agency responsible for strategically managing support of the tourism industry. He has more than 40 years of professional experience in the tourism and resort development industries, including serving as executive director of the Native Hawaiian Hospitality Association. He is also president and principal advisor for Native Sun Business Group, a consulting and project management firm focused on Hawai'i's hospitality and real estate development industries. De Fries previously led the Department of Research and Development for the County of Hawaii and served as president and CEO of Hōkūli`a, a luxury residential community on Hawai`i Island.

### Kukui Maunakea-Forth Founder & Executive Director, MA'O Organic Farms

In 2001, Kukui and husband Gary, co-founded the non-profit Wai anae Community Re-Development Corporation and MA'O Community Food Systems Initiative which operates a 280-acre USDA-certified organic farm in Wai`anae and is co-managed by youth interns in its flagship program: the MA'O Youth Leadership. Kukui currently serves as Executive and Programs Director of WCRC and the MA'O Initiative. As a long-time community advocate, the work of MA'O was a natural step for Kukui having been involved in community development for many years. Kukui is a graduate of the University of Hawaii with a BA in Pacific Island Studies.

## Joshua Stanbro Senior Policy Director, City Council of Honolulu

Josh Stanbro serves as Policy Director for the City Council of Honolulu and is also a Elemental Excelerator's Policy Lab Fellow. He previously served as Chief Resilience Officer and Executive Director for the City & County of Honolulu's Office of Climate Change, Sustainability and Resiliency and was Program Director for Environment & Sustainability at the Hawaii Community Foundation. Josh graduated from Claremont McKenna, attended the William S. Richardson School of Law, University of Hawaii at Mānoa where he earned the Cali Award for Native Hawaiian Rights, and graduated with a law degree from UC Berkeley School of Law.

Christina Monroe is an international leadership educator and program manager with 17 years of experience working with international professionals and students.
