WELCOME TO PRESIDENT SUZANNE VARES-LUM



The Friends of the East-West Center would like to welcome the new president of the East-West Center, Suzanne Vares-Lum. The FEWC Board of Directors had the pleasure of meeting President Vares-Lum at our January Board Meeting and extended our best wishes as she ushers in a new era in this new year at the Center.

President Vares-Lum is the first woman and Native Hawaiian to serve as president. She is a retired Army Major General with 34 years of service and most recently served with the US Indo-Pacific Command.

She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism and her Master of Education in Teaching from the University of Hawai`i at Manoa. As a graduate of the US Army War College, she earned a Master of Strategic Studies degree. In 2019, she became a National Security Fellow of the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. She is also an alumna of the Daniel K. Inouye Asia-Pacific Center for Security Studies.

SPOTLIGHT ON: Keoni Williams



We welcome Keoni Williams as the EWCPA representative to the Friends of the East-West Center. Keoni will be attending our Board of Director meetings and acts as a liaison between the two organizations.

Born and raised in Hawai'i, Keoni Williams is a J.D. candidate at the William S. Richardson School of Law and graduate degree fellow at the East-West Center. He currently serves on the EWC Participants Association (EWCPA) Board as the Alumni and Friends Representative. Keoni holds a dual bachelor's degree in Korean and communications from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, having studied for one year at Korea University. His interests lie at the nexus of policy, law, and the Indo-Pacific region.

How will you utilize the knowledge and experience gained at the EWC in your future endeavors? The East-West Center has offered me unparalleled access to discussions that address an important consideration: What is the role of Hawai`i in the Indo-Pacific region? This is a question that lies at the core of my academic and professional interests. Any experience and knowledge that I can gain in this regard will allow me to be more useful as the next generation of Hawai'i faces multiple global and regional challenges head-on.

What do you enjoy most about being part of the EWC community?

What I enjoy most about being a part of the East-West Center community is living at Hale Mānoa, right at the heart of the EWC campus. Living in a structure envisioned by the renown Chinese-American architect I.M. Pei, who also designed the Louvre in Paris, it is clear that this is not just any student dormitory. It was designed to foster a sense of community and a community it has built — even during a pandemic. They say friendships are made in the kitchen and that's been a reality for me since I moved in.

Any movie or TV show you've recently watched that you'd recommend seeing?

I recently watched the documentary film Patsy Mink: Ahead of the Majority. PBS Hawai'i made it available for online viewing to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the passage of Title IX, the landmark legislation for gender equity in education spearheaded by Congresswoman Patsy Takemoto Mink. The film is an important reminder of how one person can make a big difference.

Where in the world would you like to travel to and why?

I would like to travel to Chuuk, Micronesia because that's where my mother was born and raised and I've been hoping to travel there one day with her. I admire people who know their roots and I want to seek out the traditional ecological knowledge that is so abundant in the islands. Also, my relatives lament that I still don't know how to fish, so I should probably get down there sooner than later!

What would you name your boat if you had one?

I would name my boat Moen — not to be confused with the faucet brand! My mother gave me my middle name Moen to honor her home island of Weno in Chuuk, Federated States of Micronesia, which was formerly named Moen.

IN REMEMBRANCE: Fumiko Mori Halloran



The Friends of the East-West Center is saddened by the passing of former Friends board member Fumiko Mori Halloran. Fumiko passed away on November 2, 2021 in Niwot, Colorado. On behalf of the Board of Directors, the FEWC extends our deepest condolences to Fumiko's family and are grateful for her many years of support and contributions to our organization.

During her time with the board, Fumiko chaired the Mary Morgan Fund Committee until 2014.

The Mary Morgan Hewett Fund was established in 1987 by the late Robert Hewett, a longtime senior member of the East-West Center staff, in memory of his wife Mary, a well known photo-journalist who encouraged women to advance their journalistic careers. To this day, the fund provides an opportunity to enrich women's journalistic careers in the Asia-Pacific region. As of 2006, it has awarded travel grants to women who participate in the Jefferson Fellows program.

Fumiko was born on January 11, 1944 in Nagasaki, Japan to Masuo and Hisako Mori. She earned a bachelor's degree from Kyoto University with a major in Oriental history. As a Fulbright student, she studied in the School of International Affairs at Columbia University, majoring in international relations and Chinese regional studies. After earning her MA, she was a researcher in US-Japan relations in New York, Tokyo, and Washington D.C. As an author, her early book, Washington no Machi kara, [From the City of Washington] won the Oya Soichi Prize for Non-Fiction.

Before becoming a writer, she served as senior political analyst at the Japan Economic Institute in Washington, program officer at the Japan Center for International Exchange in Tokyo, and bibliographer at the Japan Documentation Center of the East Asia Institute at Columbia.

She and her husband, award-winning journalist and foreign correspondent Richard Halloran, were lifelong supporters of both the East-West Center and the Friends of the East-West Center. Her decades of voluntarism with the Friends board led her to receive the Best Friend Award in 2015.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Richard and step-son, Christopher Halloran. Fumiko is survived by her step-children, Laura Halloran Wilkason and Catherine Halloran Cook, and grandchildren, Colby Wilkason, T.J. Wilkason, Everett Cook, Anderson Cook, and Virginia Cook.

2021 ANNUAL MEETING

The Friends of the East-West Center Annual Meeting was held virtually on November 4, 2021. Proceedings began with an oli performed by Alapaki Luke followed by recognizing Apolonia Stice with the FEWC Best Friend Award and presenting out-going EWC President Dr. Richard Vuylsteke with a plaque of recognition for his leadership at the Center and support of our organization.

To be sustainable, the custom-made plaques were crafted from images of the East-West Center printed on recycled aluminum and salvaged mahogany wood sourced from Re-Use Hawai`i.

A panel discussion was held based on the topic of: "Where Do We Go From Here? Growing A Sustainable Hawai'i Post-Pandemic". Moderated by EWC's Director of Alumni Engagement, Christina Monroe, the discussion focused on how the interconnectivity of the following can grow a more sustainable Hawai'i post-pandemic: equity in tourism: how to manage the industry for the benefit of both locals and tourists; economic diversity: what other sectors will help variegate our economy; and environmental responsibility: how to address climate change as a community.


